Commissioner of Education Virginia M. Barry, Ph.D., announced that Bethany Bernasconi, a science teacher at Windham High School, is the **2012 New Hampshire Teacher of the Year**. In receiving this award, Mrs. Bernasconi becomes New Hampshire's candidate for National Teacher of the Year.

"Selecting a Teacher of the Year is an exceptional way to celebrate the many outstanding and dedicated people teaching in New Hampshire schools," said Commissioner Barry. "The NH Teacher of the Year isn't the best teacher in the State, but is meant to represent the many excellent teachers devoted to the highest level of student learning in their classrooms.
